### 6.1 Disability Access and Inclusion Plan 2023-2025 – Engagement Results (11935399)

The purpose of this report is to advise the Committee that the engagement to inform Council's next Disability Access and Inclusion Plan 2023 -2025 (DAIP) has been completed.

Engagement is an essential part of the development of the DAIP and ensures that the plan is focused on the needs of community.

The engagement focused on the four focus areas recommended by the NSW Disability Inclusion Action Planning Guidelines 2014. These are:

- Developing positive community attitudes and behaviours
- Creating liveable communities
- Supporting access to meaningful employment
- Improving access to services through better systems and process

The engagement commenced in February and was completed in July. The engagement consisted of:

- Focus groups with people with disabilities, their families and friends; service providers and staff
- 'Phone In' opportunities for people with disabilities, their families and friends; service providers and staff
- Drop in sessions for one-on-one or small group conversations for people with disabilities, their families and friends; service providers and staff
- Targeted engagement with a local specialised school, disability service providers and community organisations
- 'Let's chat' engagement with people with disabilities, their families and friends; service providers; and staff
- Social media comments
- Engagement with Councillors

A summary of the findings from the engagement is outlined in the Attachment – DAIP Engagement Results. More specific details are being collated and will be made available at the next meeting.

Whilst the previous Committee was given an opportunity to provide input into the Plan, an opportunity exists for current Committee members to provide input to the plan at this meeting.

It is a requirement of the Disability Inclusion Act 2014 that the new Plan is in place by 30 November 2023.

### What we heard...

From January to July 2022 Shellharbour City Council organised and participated in a range of engagement methods to ask the community about disability, access and inclusion. Each engagement was targeted at finding out the community's thoughts and ideas on any of the 4 key components of our DAIP:

- Supporting access to meaningful employment
- Improving access to services through better systems and processes

These engagements targeted people with disabilities & their carers; service providers for people with disability; schools and pre-schools; seniors; community event attenders; staff and Councillors. ### 6.2 International Day of People with Disability – 3 December 2022 (11935420)

The purpose of this report is to inform the Committee of the Celebration of Ability Calendar of Events which is a Council initiative to celebrate International Day of People with Disability (IDPWD).

IDPWD is held on 3 December each year. It is an opportunity to challenge the way people think about disability and to grow a more inclusive Australia.

Each year, Council celebrates IDPWD by producing the Celebration of Ability Calendar of Events – a resource developed in collaboration with Wollongong City Council. Organisations across the Illawarra/Shoalhaven that host events in recognition of the Day are encouraged to promote their event in the Calendar.

This year an e-calendar will be produced that will cover events held from Monday 28 November to Friday 9 December 2022.

The production of the Celebration of Ability Calendar of Events meets Focus Area 1 of the Disability Access and Inclusion Plan 'Developing Positive Community Attitudes and Behaviours.'

### 6.3 Comprehensive Self-Assessment Update (11935425)

The purpose of this report is to update the Committee on the progress being made on the Comprehensive Self-Assessment (CSA) against the Australian Network on Disability's Access and Inclusion Index.

Council has made a commitment to complete the CSA for the Access and Inclusion Index, to assist in the further access and inclusion improvements across the organisation.

The CSA has 10 key areas - these are:

- 1. Commitment
- 2. Premises
- 3. Workplace Adjustments
- 4. Communication and Marketing
- 5. Products and Services
- 6. Information, Communication and Technology
- 7. Recruitment and Selection
- 8. Career Development
- 9. Suppliers and Partners
- 10. Innovation

To complete the CSA it is necessary to engage with the staff in the organisation that are best placed to assist with the identification and sourcing of information and resources to respond to the key area of the self-assessment. This recognises that access and inclusion is everyone's responsibility, engages many sections of Council in the process, and recognises that the staff in the department are best place to make change.

Initial contact has been made with seven departments across Council to progress reporting in five of the key areas. These include Information, Communication and Technology; Recruitment and Selection; Suppliers and Partners; Communication and Marketing; and Innovation.

The initial contact to progress the reporting for the other five key areas will be rolled out during September through to November with the CSA scheduled for submission in December 2022/January 2023.

The completion of the CSA and the benchmarking of our access and inclusion performance will help inform many of Council's strategies including the Disability Access and Inclusion Plan, Age Friendly Strategy and Diversity and Inclusion Strategy.

#### 6.4 AS4299 – Adaptable Housing Standard (11935434)

The purpose of this report is to seek the Committee's support for Council to write to Standards Australia seeking an update to the AS4299 - Adaptable Housing Standard as it does not reflect modern accessible design.

The AS4299 - Adaptable Housing Standard was written 30 years ago and many of the requirements no longer reflect modern accessible design and may need updating. For example, some of the referenced appendices reflect superseded standards and do not reflect the design intent of the updated standards.

The Association of Consultants in Access Australia (ACAA) is the peak national body for access consultancy in Australia and a major partner in advancing equity of built environmental accessibility for people with a disability. The ACAA have advocated that the AS4299 Standards need to be revised to ensure adequate measures are taken to assist people with disability to find appropriate housing.

Page 60 of our Development Control Plan (DCP) references the AS4299 Adaptable Housing 'to provide independent living opportunities for different ages and abilities'. Supporting the request for the Australian Standard to be revised will ensure that our DCP reflects modern accessible design with the potential to provide better outcomes for residents.

Advocate for improved access and inclusion outcomes in the 'whole of government' policy setting meets many actions in the Disability Access and Inclusion Plan including Focus Area 2: Creating Liveable Communities.

Dear Sir/Madam.

The Association of Consultants in Access Australia (ACAA) is the peak national body for access consultancy in Australia and a major partner in advancing equity of built environmental accessibility for people with a disability.

ACAA is seeking to have AS4299 - Adaptable Housing Standard updated as it doesn't reflect modern accessible design. The Standard was written 30 years ago and many of the requirements are no longer relevant or need updating. For example, some of the referenced informative Appendices reflect superseded standards, and do not reflect the design intent of the updated standards.

We consider the proposed update will simplify the requirements, normative checklists provide clarity, and reduce the cost of adaption, by providing the opportunity to factor in contingences at the design stage which will in turn assist people with disability to find appropriate housing. As a Council who requires adaptable housing through your DCP we are seeking your support to propose to Standards Australia that the Standard be revised.

#### Dear George

I am writing to you to add my support to the revision of AS4299 Adaptable Housing. The standard is essential to the functioning capabilities of Parramatta's Development Control Plans.

The standard is now 27 years old and needs to be updated to reflect the changes within the industry including the tightening up some of the language and diagrams to ensure the intent of the standard is upheld and maintained into the future.

In 2018 the Australian Bureau of Statistics reported that 4.4 million Australians reported living with a disability with 49.6% of the population 65 years and over having a disability. The increase in age related disability requires ongoing efforts to ensure suitable accommodation can be provided.

The Adaptable Housing Standard 4299 provides the tools suitable for individualised accommodation.
